For others, we are a lifeline of resources, people, and tools to help make life more manageable on a daily basis. Each person we serve is unique, with a different level of need. ## **AccessCNY** Expands Support for Veterans

ccessCNY was recently awarded a \$2,000 grant from The Million Dollar Roundtable (MDRT) Foundation to support services for veterans with mental health issues. The grant will help AccessCNY expand housing supports to retired service men and women.

AccessCNY currently assists veterans with mental health issues locate affordable and safe housing. This is a vital service that provides veterans stability. At present, the service only provides a roof over the veteran's head. Funding from the MDRT Foundation will help make the house

more comfortable and livable by providing essentials like beds, tables and chairs, kitchen items, and other home staples. The grant will give veterans a home that they can be proud to call their own.

The grant was made possible with the assistance of John Enright of Custom Wealth Management, a member of the MDRT. Enright is a long-time supporter of AccessCNY and worked with agency staff to determine the community need and complete the application. AccessCNY, along with Custom Wealth Management, plans to grow the program in the future with the assistance of the MDRT Foundation.



# Americans With Disabilities Act 25th Anniversary



people of all ages and abilities gathered in downtown Syracuse to celebrate the 25th anniversary of the passing of the Americans with Disabilities Act. Signed in 1990, the ADA

n July 23,



prohibits discrimination based on disability and requires access to employment and accessibility in public places, including public transportation and telecommunication. Band members from AccessCNY's Acquired Brain Injury day habilitation program - The David Clark Learning Center - played tunes to welcome the marchers. Attendees listened to inspiring stories of the progress that has been made over the years and reflected on work that still needs to be done. Sally Johnston, Advocacy Coordinator for AccessCNY and President of the Board of Directors for Disabled in Action of Greater Syracuse, Inc., has dedicated her life to fighting for the rights of individuals with disabilities. "Lives have changed significantly over the past 25 years as a result of the ADA, but we still have a long way to go," Sally commented. "Many people with disabilities still remain warehoused in nursing homes and institutions and discrimination in employment still exists. It is only through awareness and collaborative action that we can hope to ensure that all people have access to equal opportunities."
